25 Years after the Fall of the Wall: Looking Back, Looking Forward A joint initiative of the residents and neighbours of Pariser Platz Series of events on 2 November 2014

On 2 November the residents and neighbours of Pariser Platz will commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Fall of the Berlin Wall with a series of events. The initiative aims to draw attention to the historic renaissance of Pariser Platz after 1989 and highlight the importance of the location as a symbol of freedom. Ten events on the afternoon of Sunday, 2 November 2014, will address the topic "25 years after the Fall of the Wall" in a variety of ways. The history of Pariser Platz as a place of division and unity will be the subject of lectures, readings and discussions. Events on European and foreign policy and on overcoming new "walls" in politics and society will shine a light on the present day and the future. The institutions involved will invite Berliners and visitors to gain new impressions and enter into discussion with each other.

At this event, twelve outstanding pioneers in social innovation representing the areas of education, urban living, health and culture will discuss their "wall breaking" ideas with the public in a coffee house atmosphere. Marie-Luise Scherer's "Die Hundegrenze" (lit: The Dogs' Border) is a triumph of literary reportage. The main protagonists are not only refugees and sharpshooters, but also the guard dogs patrolling the border. From the perspective of collie mongrel Alf, the realities and absurdities of the German-German border with its minefields, guard towers, shooting ranges and dog runs are brought to life in a precise and evocative way. Marie-Luise Scherer, winner of the 2011Heinrich Mann Prize of the Akademie der Künste, will conduct the reading.
